Course Content (incl. planned learning activities and teaching methods)	<p>The main project is a self-recruited assignment you will work on both individually and with your project group. The focus in this project is on solving a problem of a real client by means of other parties (stakeholders), which need to be mapped, analyzed and activated. This semester has been organized according the principles of Design Thinking. The most important difference with a more traditional approach is that you work with loops instead of fully finished phases that lead to predefined products. So you will follow your own path. Also the design of your classes is open, as you determine this together with your supervisor and co-students.</p> <p>In the Deep dive we will pay special attention to the important stakeholder groups from the public and NGO sector. By means of workshops you will discover what they entail and how they should be seen in the bigger picture of stakeholder management. You will work on a specific case to obtain these insights.</p>
Literature	All literature will be provided via a specifically designed website by means of digital 'building blocks'
Assessment and criteria	<p>For the project (Scanning, Sampling, Giving meaning and Activating) after every loop there will be a 1 hour oral exam (with the rest of your project group). The assessment will be done via a specific evaluation form, which also includes a self-assessment.</p> <p>For the Deep dive the assessment is a multimedia presentation in which you work out/explain the case you worked on with your group; the final grade is a combination of a group and an individual component.</p>
